


The Road to Villawood



Villawood Detention Centre. is run by the Dept of Immigration and people are held in there for all sorts of reasons relating to visas. Almost a year ago we received an email from a detainee. I contacted a member who went in to see the detainee and got talking to one of the staff members. He then received a call from the psychiatrist who asked if it would be possible to start an AA meeting in there. The call then went out for members willing to participate. Unfortunately there has been very little enthusiasm for this particular 12th step work but the original member persisted and, with strong support from the psychiatrist, AA is now able to help more than one man in there. Many of the men seeking our help will not be allowed to remain in Australia and will be retuned to countries where alcoholism results in extreme punishment. It is so important that these men get help to remain sober. It's not easy to get into Villawood but if you want to help let Leigh know and she'll put you in touch with the member

On the island Vanua Levu.... an AA priest carried the message about 29 years ago.... and the spark was carried back to them by a young lady who attended the "Fellowship in Fiji Convention"! We will help start this meeting again. The computer donated by John can be used for this, as they need a strong system to hook up from there. Also I will be seeking funds to bring a group again to Vanua Levu... Higher Power sure rocks ...never doubt that miracles do still occur! Read on for her experience The reaction of my parents took me by surprise. When I started sharing my recovery experience with them, they were blown away. My father said that I have given him a new life. He just couldn't get over it. My sharing has renewed his faith in the AA program. Brought him a lot of memories from when he started out in the program. We kept sharing the whole weekend. He couldn't get enough. He dug out his old AA material and has started reading again. Its just amazing how he responded to my stories of the struggles and the miracles that began to happen. He identified with everything, slapping his knee and saying, "Yes! I know exactly what you're talking about! That's right!" We laughed and cried together. It was a truly spiritual weekend. My higher power was at work. He collected his old buddie and shared my stories with them. Some of them are his old AA friends who did the program with him some 25+ years ago. They were fascinated. He just couldn't contain his joy. I spoke with him this morning and he said that mum and him were still amazed by my coming in the weekend. They were still discussing AA whole morning when I called. It made me so emotional when I wake up early in the morning and listening to them in the kitchen making breakfast and sharing about the AA experience. He is coming back to the program. Once I get his laptop fixed and send it back to Labasa, he will get online for our Skype meetings. God is at work here! I am just blown away by what is happening right now to my family. They have called up my other siblings and shared with them my experiences, hoping that they too will join in the future.

Yesterday, before our meeting at Bahai Hall, I spoke with my father who was still coming to terms with the miracle that has happened. His whole life changed instantly. He wanted so badly to attend a meeting that I decided to call him in through the phone during the meeting so he can listen in. We all shared yesterday as he and my mum listened in through the phone. He was so emotional because it was his first meeting after 25+ years. Last night his buddies came over to our house where he shared my experience, struggles and miracles yet again. He took out his AA materials and they all went through it again, rekindling what was brought to them years ago by Fr. Sigarara.



They have asked for more materials and maybe a chance to start a meeting there. Yes, I think it would be very beneficial for them to use the computer in Labasa. My father had given me his laptop to be fixed by my brother (who is also an alcoholic. His wife also). I went by his place last night to drop off the computer and they asked me to tell them yet again about how I ended up in the cell! Hahaha. I didn't mind at all. I knew something was about to happen here also. I told them the same things I shared with my father. Walked them through my experience, strength and hope. The struggles, the

miracles. Before I was half way through, they had tears in their eyes. I was overwhelmed with emotion when they admitted that they were also alcoholic and they were struggling to manage their lives.

They are keen in joining the meetings, at least once, and see from there. I knew the seed has been planted and that is all that matters. A power greater than ourselves is at work here. I am truly humbled.



The highlight for us last month was our presence at the **Generation Next conference**. Fellowship members from both Areas manned the display information table. We spoke to many health workers, school nurses, teachers, school counsellors, etc. They were very interested in what AA offered for their students, and were **surprised that it was free**. One health worker assumed we hired speakers our Contact Details Follow Up List was completed by **5 delegates**, **all requiring speakers and more literature**. After follow up emails to those delegates, we are now organising speakers and literature for 3 regional schools, one alternative education college (8 locations in WA) and a helpline. Both Areas sponsored this event with Swan Districts funding the

literature .

Our "QR Business Cards" have been printed and are in circulation. Swan Districts have included these with the courts literature. And thank you to Sheonagh who has added the QR code to our Community Flyer. We actually ran out of these cards at the GenNext conference.

Following on from the successful Cyril Jackson School Health Festival (AreaA), we now have a display stand at Kelmscott S.H.S Health Day (Area B).

Not only are we passing on our recovery message at these events, but both Areas are helping each other in various ways. This is **service**, **unity and fellowship in action**.

I attended the **WANADA Brekky Table** - Working With Youth - and afterwards spoke with both guest speakers (**the Fremantle Family Support Network** and the Drug and Alcohol Youth Services). The outcome was that Kerry I and Joyce from Area B met with and supplied literature to FFSN, and **DAYS** has invited **AA** to visit them to chat about what assistance we may be able to give to their clients. Sometimes the best outcome happens after the main event.



Our world delegate Tony was our MC and Alison from Boonah opened the luncheon with her story. The feedback was they found the sharing part of the luncheon very interesting and insightful.

Following this Brian S did a 20min presentation with the main focus being what AA does and doesn't do and how we can cooperate with outside services.

The **primary goal** of hosting this luncheon for community leaders/local service providers was to:

- Break down pre-existing stigmas/preconceived ideas of what an alcoholic is?
- Provide an overview of AA and the fellowship
- Increase the confidence of these services to invite AA into their array of services offered either to their workplace/clients. AND MAKE REFERELL TO AA
- Increase awareness of AA

The **outcome** of this luncheon allowed links to be made and many opportunities for service work and potential 12 step calls.

The common theme which was highlighted by a number of service providers was the use of alcohol by staff in these services. It was identified that staff in highly stressful situations were using alcohol after work and returning to their shifts the next morning still under the influence. They were more interested in having AA members into the workplace to address there staff, which we found exciting.

Also Geelong members regularly go to 2 residential rehabs and 1 day Hab. A huge thank you to the member who organizes the Rosters. It is not an easy job.

Update from Australian Association of Practice Nurses Convention

AA is speaking to Practice Managers in Newcastle and Bundaberg. Also just confirmed AA is going to be present at a Practice Managers training Day in Perth. There will be over 30 Practice Managers present. Some of the Medical Centres have more than 10 Doctors. So for us to be able to talk to these Professionals and give them Literature is huge. I have just had an email from The Regional Pi Coordinator in Perth. She is so excited to be taking part in these training days and AA is being invited to attend many more of these days next year in WA. All this because the members in Area D have made contributions to PI through their Districts, Groups and of course the amazing fund raising efforts of the members so we could attend these Professional Expos and give out Literature and make these relationships. We have the chance to reach so many sick and suffering Alcoholics through this vital Service Work.

Generation Next. (Mental Health Expo for Young People Melbourne)

Not as big as last year. We gave out **55 PI Packs for the Professional.** Also this time we made up literature kits for their workplace instead of waiting to send them out. We had **post-cards** made up of the teenage PI Poster and **put the questions from the Message to Teenagers on the reverse.** These proved a great hit with the professionals. Out of the 500 of each of the girl teenager and boy teenager cards we had only about 50 of each left. Also we gave out **packs of 1300 cards**. We explained to everyone about the **videos on the aa.org website**. Also the links to stories. Many said they were going to include viewing the website in their classes for year 11 and year 12.

Yet again it has been re- enforced how important it is to **explain the website and the 1300** because people just don't know. Made some good contacts to follow up with an organization for homeless people, a local grammar school, and a practice nurse for a centre with 17 doctors. She went away with lots of brochures for the surgery.

A Melbourne council wants brochures for their offices. A local counselling service here in Melbourne wants Literature for their office and only one Interstate this time and that is for a school in Mt Gambier. It became clear that I should make up packs for schools and explain the format in writing of our school talks.

Most times the Teachers present were not the principles and we could only tell them we can come to the schools and talk to the students. My takeaway was to have packs specially targeted for schools in our PI Kit. Many thanks to the 2 volunteers who helped out today. They were brilliant. We had to start out at 5.30 this morning but came away feeling on a high. The two members who helped experienced this level of service for the first time. While they were a bit nervous they soon relaxed and were fabulous at talking to the Professionals and telling their stories. Both said don't forget us next time we want to come back again.
