Chair's Welcome

Hi all and welcome to the latest Board's Newsletter. I would like to thank all our members out there doing valuable service work to enable the suffering alcoholic to hear our message of recovery.

Well what's been happening? The Board had its first face to face meeting since February 2020 in July in Sydney. We found out our Board members and GSO staff have legs after all and are not just pretty faces. The meeting went very well and I believe some good decisions were made.

Preliminary results show that most respondents were 40 to 69 years of age. Very few were under 20 (0.17%). They tend to live in metro areas (47%). Less than 2% reported living in remote areas. 5.5% reported a disability that made it hard to attend meetings. There are some interesting results on our response to on-line meetings. A full report will be collated once the Survey has closed.

I have attended a couple of great Regional Forums. An on-line one hosted by NE Region and a face to face in Central Region. Both were quite different but were a great way of sharing service. Lots of enthusiasm. I look forward to the Eastern Regional Forum in Canberra in September. If your region hasn't had one for a while consider asking an Area to put in a bid.

Finally my best wishes to all those who are looking at Conference Topics. Please have your say via your Group GSR, District and Area. It's important for our Fellowship's health that we have an informed Group Conscience at our General Service Conference.

Remote Communities Report

Connection, communities and hope

It is with much gratitude that I had the opportunity alongside two other AA members to attend the National Indigenous Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Conference in Cairns between 15 August - 17 August 2022 to take part in the collective effort to understand significant national challenges.

The excited Parramatta State Primary School dancers set the agenda demonstrating the importance of connection, community and inclusion through traditional dance involving girls from all cultural backgrounds, followed by a powerful and deeply personal Welcome to Country by Auntie Jeanette Singleton, a Yirrganydji woman from Yorkeys Knob and a respected traditional elder of the Yirrganydji people. Auntie Jeanette who is third stolen generation, spoke about her 12-year-old great-grandfather playing witness to the English as they crossed the shore and the first mission established in Yarrabah. Auntie, through her explanation of her spiritual connection to country rooted in a history many, many thousands of years prior clearly embodies the fortitude and personal resilience demonstrated to lead critical work addressing wellbeing of Indigenous communities.

Conference theme, 'The impossible is just the next step for us in our journey' was echoed through presentations across themes of acceptance, courage and connection to self, to family, to country, to spirit.

Speakers coming from all backgrounds, ages and abilities spoke to their own truth with deep connection to singular purpose of service. Inspiring stories included Dr Tim White's training and mental health work in the Aurukun

community, Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Support Officer from Karralika (ACT) Jonathan Cornforth's brave suicide survival story titled 'Six Commodore Airbags', and insights from his therapist Merv Edmunds who has worked with young people to reach their potential for the past 30 years.

We were so fortunate to hear of the experiences from Māori Health Psychologist Dr Amber Logan & Native American Clinical Psychologist Dr Joseph Stone from Blackfeet tribe about intergenerational trauma and traditional healing methods deeply rooted in spiritual practice that had yielded much success.

We had the opportunity to have honest and informative conversations with many people about AA who were surprisingly unaware of meetings in their own area or knew little of how it works. We also displayed AA for Indigenous Australians brochures in the trade area which were quite popular. This conference was an excellent way to have meaningful conversations about AA and many new project ideas were suggested by elders and community leaders including AA visiting remote communities.

In the spirit of AA, we attended two meetings in Cairns, warmly welcomed by local members and heard the messages of hope, unity, service, and love, loud and clear which reinforced the importance of proactively connecting with our communities both urban and remote to help the suffering alcoholic where we can.

Experiences like this fill me with hope because through connection and working with others we can achieve so much. I am so grateful to have spent quality time with two other like-minded folk on this journey and hope we can action some of the suggested ways to carry the message.
